HAWAII MARINE ANIMAL RESPONSE

Established in 2016, Hawaii Marine Animal Response (HMAR) is the largest Hawaii-based marine species response and conservation organization. HMAR is the field operations arm of Hawaii Marine Mammal Alliance, a U.S.-based 501(c)(3) non-profit corporation. We are deeply committed to advancing marine protected species* and ocean conservation in Hawaii. Our efforts enable rescue, research, education, and conservation for the present and future to come.

Our primary goal is the reduction of human-caused threats to Hawaii's marine protected species and our ocean ecosystem. To achieve that goal we work to achieve three primary goals: (1) growing active community support, (2) managing and recovering protected animal populations, and (3) savings animals that need help.

We focus on marine life that is most likely to be most affected by humans, such as the highly endangered Hawaiian monk seal, sea turtles, seabirds, dolphins, and whales. Through our outreach, field response, interventions, rescue and stranding support programs, we work every day to move towards our shared vision of Hawaii's ocean ecosystem thriving through sustainable harmony between humans and marine animals.



OUR STORY

HMAR began in 2016 as a response and outreach organization that focused solely on the endangered Hawaiian monk seal. What started as a mission to educate beach-goers about this at-risk species to inspire stewardship evolved into a multi-faceted organization committed to the full circle recovery of multiple species and the ocean ecosystem.

Over the years, we've expanded to include additional species and programs. In 2020, we are now engaged in conservation, education, response, rescue, stranding support, and habitat stewardship spanning six programs that positively impact over 35 different marine protected species.

Our efforts are focused primarily on Hawaii's most populated island, Oahu, where many human-related impacts to marine protected animals and the ocean are concentrated. While the issues we address are complex, we are determined to tackle them on all fronts.


MOTIVATION & VISION

Many of the threats to marine life are connected to one another, which is why HMAR applies a full-circle approach to conservation. With the growing impact and presence of these threats, there's no denying the increased critical need for for action and support of our marine environment.

KEY THREATS



Habitat loss due to climate change and related impacts affect the marine animals we work with in innumerable ways. With sea level rise threatening coastal nesting and pupping habitats, increasing storm surges destroying nests and other critical coastal areas, and warming ocean temperature threatening the health of the crucial coral reefs, climate change is the driving factor of habitat loss.





Fishery interactions and marine debris are some of the most significant threats to marine protected species and cause severe injury and death.

Entanglements and ingestion incidents caused by materials and marine debris left behind such as hooks, netting and fishing line are an ever-looming danger for our native marine life.







Other growing threats, such as human caused trauma, disease, and boat strikes, are directly caused by humans. Our programs aim to educate, respond, and provide comprehensive action that minimizes the impact of disease on marine populations and connect our community to the ocean to improve stewardship.

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WHERE WE ARE

To provide a truly impactful and comprehensive approach to our marine life conservation efforts, HMAR is engaged with devoted volunteers, interns and partners spanning six different programs.

Field Support & Outreach Program

Our Field Support & Outreach Program conducts marine protected animal and habitat monitoring, collects critical field data for research and conducts face-to-face public outreach along shorelines. We share information with beach goers about marine protected species to inspire stewardship, and gather information to help monitor population and habitat health. Since our start, our team members in this program have provided field support more than 12,500 times and have reached more than 260,000 people with face-to-face outreach.

Rescue & Stranding Response Program

Our Rescue and Stranding Response Program helps animals in distress to assess, disentangle, de-hook, transport for care, release into the wild, and facilitate scientific research to gain more insight on threats and improve species management plans. To date, our first responders have performed over 750 animal rescues and escalations.

Marine Debris Program

Member of our team involved in our new Marine Debris Program dive the near-shore coastal waters of Oahu to remove hazardous threats to marine animals and proactively minimize impacts to marine life. We've removed hundreds of entanglement or hooking hazards since this program began in August 2019.





Marine Operations Program

Our Marine Operations Program utilizes HMAR vessels and crews to support on-water response, habitat surveys, rescue, and transportation of injured or stranded marine animals in distress. Since this program began in 2017, we've conducted hundreds of hours of training and performed over 60 on-water missions.

Education & Engagement Program

Our Education & Engagement Program visits community events, classrooms, and local businesses to connect our communities and inspire stewardship for Hawaii's marine life and our shared ocean. To date, members of this team have participated in over 200 school or community events reaching over 10,000 people.

Dispatch & Reporting Program

Our Dispatch & Reporting Program manages our hotlines that receive thousands of calls every year from the public and government agencies to ensure we can mount the most appropriate field action needed. This program also records and shares data obtained in the field with government research and species management partners to help conservation and recovery efforts. To date, our Dispatch & Reporting Program has received over 30,000 hotline calls regarding marine protected animals that may need support.



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ON THE HORIZON



The coming year brings new promises of hope to meet the challenges facing Hawaii's marine protected species and the ocean they call home. In addition to the significant program operations already underway, in 2020 and beyond we will increase our efforts and work harder than before to deliver positive impacts for the many people who contribute to our organization and to increase stewardship and conservation for our marine environment and animals. Thanks to you, we are continuing to grow and expand. Here are some projects we are embarking upon in 2020.

Sea Turtle Nesting Habitat Survey and Improvement Project

Green Sea Turtles living around the main Hawaiian islands are at a uniquely critical position. Climate change and rising sea levels are impacting traditional sea turtle nesting grounds in the Northwestern Hawaiian Islands. Therefore, identifying nests and improving sea turtle nesting habitat and outcomes in the main Hawaiian Islands, like Oahu, can protect this species from extinction.

Seabird Nesting Habitat Surveys and Improvement Project

Several vulnerable seabird species face significant threats from invasive predators that decimate their ground-based nests. It is critical that we increase surveys and invasive predator controls to reduce increasing threats to our seabird nesting habitats.

Fishing Debris Bins Project

As part of our growing Marine Debris Program, we have partnered with the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) and the State of Hawaii to divert fishing gear from ending up in our coastal ecosystem. By implementing fishing debris bins at heavily-used fishing location, we can provide fishers the option to dispose of gear responsibly, help keep our ocean cleaner, and stop hooking and entanglement hazards from entering the ocean at the source.

Hawaii Marine Science Center (HMSC)

Our ultimate goal is to bridge the full circle of marine protected animal conservation through education, response, rescue, rehabilitation, and release. To this end, HMAR is developing our Hawaii Marine Science Center (HMSC) project.

HMSC will be a centralized facility that focuses on ocean conservation education, marine animal rescue, rehabilitation, and recovery through an onsite marine animal hospital. HMSC will be a one-of-a-kind facility in the Pacific devoted to ocean literacy and marine protected animal support and recovery while providing a deeply personal and motivational experience for our guests.
